8:15 – 9:15am MST	<p>Clinical Implications of Synthetic Cannabinoid and Synthetic Hallucinogen Abuse <i>Snehal Bhatt, MD</i></p> <p>1 CEU Credit</p> <p>Data has shown that alcohol and drug use in the AI/AN population: begins at a younger age, tend to be used more often and in higher quantities, and experience more negative consequences from them. This presentation focuses on the use of synthetic cannabinoids and hallucinogens that has gained prevalence across the US over the past several years. Unfortunately, these substances are evolving at a very rapid rate, and it has been difficult for clinicians to keep up with these developments. At the same time, it is essential for clinicians to stay updated about these substances, including their effects, testing methods, and treatments, in order to best serve their communities.</p> <p>After attending this activity, participants will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. State how emerging drugs of abuse are forever changing and involve manipulation of 	<p>Promoting HPV Vaccination Among Youth <i>Cheyenne Jim MS, Shannon Wright, RN, John Ratmeyer, MD, FAAP</i></p> <p>No Credits Provided</p> <p>Nationwide HPV vaccine uptake is less than optimal. Coverage with 1st dose of HPV is lower than Tdap and Meningococcal; with all three vaccines recommended to be given at same time. This indicates that there are missed opportunities for HPV vaccination. IHS has an average series completion rate for HPV of 59.6% (female) and 39.8.1% (male) as of December 31, 2014.</p> <p>After attending this activity, participants will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death for AI/AN youth 15-24 years old. Describe the advantages of suicide prevention as a core component for health care. <p>Disclosure Statement: The presenter has no financial relationship to this program.</p>	<p>Baby Friendly Sustainability Initiative <i>CAPT Tina Tah, MSN; CAPT Suzan Murphy; LT Jenna Meyer; and Antoinette Kleiner</i></p> <p>No Credits Provided</p> <p>In 2011, the Indian Health Service (IHS) embarked on the Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative (BFHI) which resulted in one hundred percent of the IHS Obstetric (OB) hospitals becoming Baby Friendly (BF) designated in November 2014. BFHI is a quality improvement initiative and an evidenced-based preventive service to support moms to breastfeed their babies in a supportive environment. The BFHI includes implementing the Ten Steps to Successful Breastfeeding. Currently, the IHS is working to sustain BFHI at all IHS OB hospitals to help prevent and manage chronic disease in the AI/AN population. IHS Leadership knowledge and support of the BFHI is integral to sustaining the initiative.</p> <p>After attending this activity, participants will be able to:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Recognize the benefits of breastfeeding and the history of the BFHI in IHS. 2. Describe the BFHI Sustainability Plan and actions taken at IHS obstetric hospitals to sustain Baby-Friendly designation. 3. Provide support needed for IHS OB hospitals to comply with current BFUSA Guidelines, and Evaluation Criteria in order to retain their Baby-Friendly designation.

Describe the elements of an effective approach to recovery from compassion fatigue and burnout (CFBT). 4.
