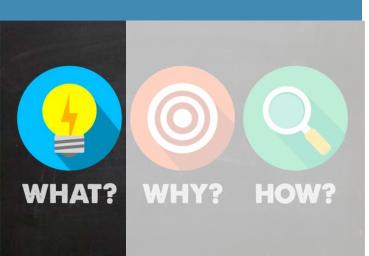

Characteristics of Partnerships in Emergency Preparedness

- Different Structures
 - Emergency Support Function 8 (ESF-8)
 - Ad-hoc Workgroups
 - Healthcare Coalitions



- Multi-disciplinary
- Multi-jurisdictional
- All-hazard
- Threat specific









Reasons for Initiating Collaboration and Partnerships

- Increasing opportunities to learn and adopt new skills
- Securing access to resources
- Sharing financial risks and costs
- Gaining input from more or different members of the community
- Aligning efforts for maximum impact
- Information exchange
- Tackle challenges in the community





Partnership Perspective

Local and State public health agency collaborations with Tribal government

- 41% of LHDs work with Tribal governments (information exchange)
- 13% of LHDs regularly schedule meetings, have written agreements, or share personnel/resources with Tribal government
- 53% of SHDs share information and resources with Tribal governments through formal and informal agreements.

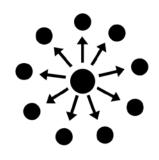

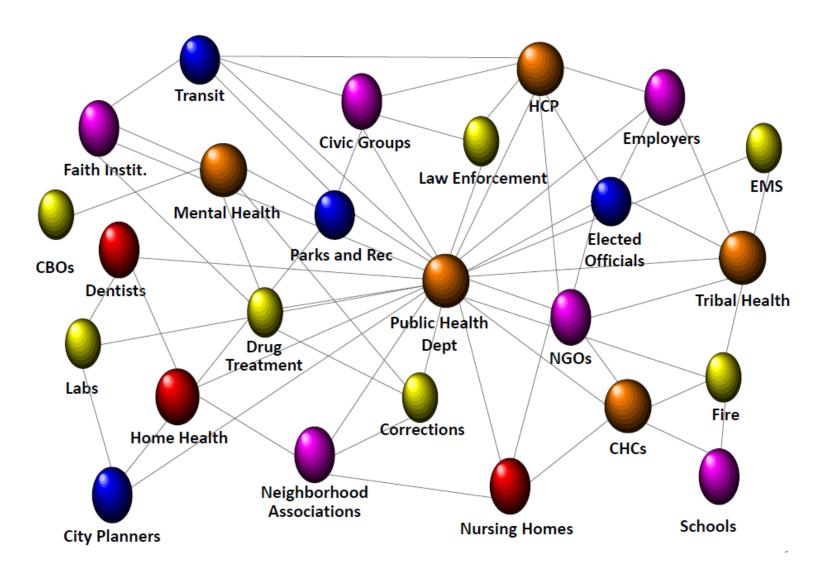

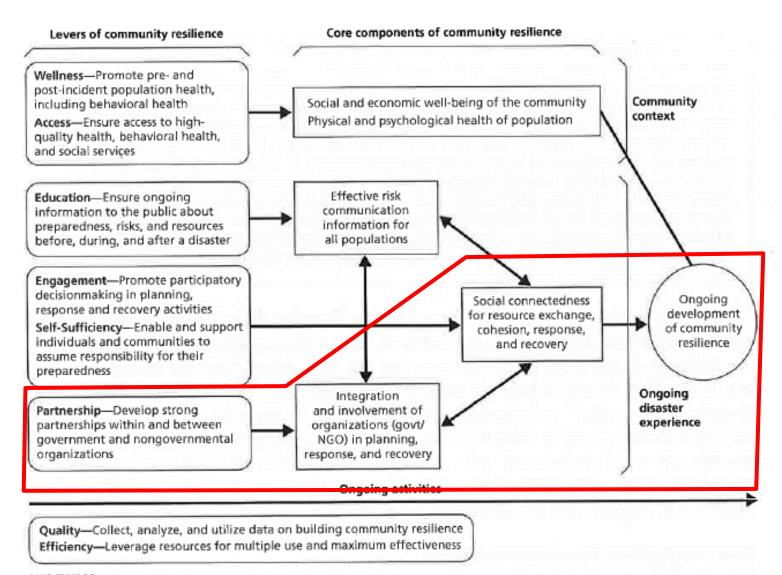








Impact of Partnerships on Community Resilience



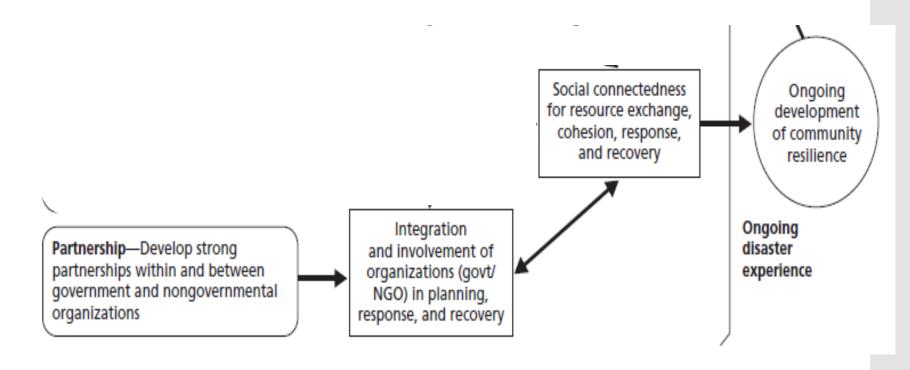

Organizing for Success:

- Determine the necessity of the partnership
- Identify and organize participants
- Define Roles and Responsibilities
- Design the planning process
- Assess resource needs
- Determine how process/partnership will be managed







Exploring Benefits and Barriers of Stakeholders

 Values: What are the commitments and beliefs guiding the behaviors and decision making processes?

 Loyalties: What obligations does the person/entity have to people outside his or her immediate group?

Losses: what does the person/entity fear losing?

Role of ASTHO and NACCHO

ASTHO and NACCHO Recent Tribal Work

- Choctaw Nation's use of pharmacies as health hubs as well as using traditional Choctaw foods in hypertension reducing diet recommendations.
- Increasing access to medication and services to Eastern Aleutian Tribes
- Alzheimer's Association update to the Healthy Brain Initiative v.3 for tribal populations.
- Mohegan Tribal Health Department's partnership with Uncas Health District on disease prevention initiatives and closed PODs.
- Indian Healthcare Resource Center (IHCRC) partnership with the Tulsa Health Department Emergency Preparedness and Response program on full-scale exercises and open POD sites
- Washoe County Health District (NY) collaborates with Tribes in the area as POD partners and the development of Crisis Standards of Care for the state.
