

AMERICAN INDIAN AND ALASKA NATIVE

SUICIDE FACT SHEET




American Indians/Alaska Natives (AI/ANs) had the highest ageadjusted suicide rate of any racial or ethnic group in 2022.¹




- Suicide was the 9th leading cause of death for AI/ANs in 2021 and 2022. In 2023, it was the 8th leading cause.²
- From 2015 to 2020, the non-Hispanic AI/AN suicide rate increased by nearly 20%, compared to less than one percent in the overall U.S. population.³
- About one in two AI/AN suicides occurred in nonmetropolitan areas, compared to one in five for non-AI/ANs.

Suicide was the second leading cause of death among American Indians/Alaska Natives ages 15-24 in 2021.


- In 2022, the highest age-adjusted suicide rate among all males and by race or ethnicity was for American Indian/Alaska Native men (39.2 deaths per 100,000 standard population).¹
- Among all females, American Indian/Alaska Native women also had the highest suicide rate in 2022 (14.4 deaths per 100,000). This rate increased from 2021 by 13.8%.




American Indians/Alaska Natives, especially youth and young adults, have high rates of serious suicidal thoughts and suicide attempts.




Al/AN youth ages 12-17 experienced increased rates of serious thoughts about suicide from 2022 to 2023.⁴



AI/ANs 18 or older had the **highest** rates of suicide attempts in 2022 and 2023.



Al/AN young adults ages 18-25 had the highest rates of serious thoughts about suicide in 2022 and 2023.



AI/AN high schoolers (especially females) had the highest rate of suicide attempts (one or more) in 2021. 5
